### The Story of Jesus

Each week in worship, we walk through Jesus's life and ministry. This year, we are primarily in Mark's gospel. In February, we transition from the season of Epiphany to the season of Lent. Lent is a season where we contemplate Jesus'

sacrifice for us on the Cross. We consider his determination to give Himself for our sins.

This year, in the season of Lent, we will consider critical miracles in Mark's gospel. Mark records at least ten essential miracles that point to Jesus' authority or power. Each miracle highlights an area in which Jesus is in charge. As we follow Mark's story, it becomes clear that Jesus is God, able to offer Himself as the sacrifice for our sins.

I hope you will join us each week as we step into the story. I have included a schedule for you to read ahead each Sunday as you prepare for worship.

## PASTORAL MINISTRY

Our Adult Education Retreat produced a number of takeaways. This is the third Lamplighter where I share snippets from our retreat to serve as important reminders. For those who did not attend the retreat, I still encourage you to consider these approaches within the context of all sorts of divisive issues, not just the retreat theme (the retreat theme was about moving from an adversarial to a missional posture pertaining to the topic of human sexuality).

This month, I'd like to share the **second** and **third** steps to cultivating a missional (not adversarial) posture of dialogue. Please join us in prayerfully discerning the statements below, and how God may be asking us to respond.

### Recognize & own your situated-ness in an ecclesial tradition

The United Church of Canandaigua is firmly rooted in the historic teachings of biblical Christianity. With regard to the specific matter of human sexuality, the position of the United Church is identical to that of historic Christianity and reflects the general 'sensus fidelium' across time and geography.

## Recognize the tension inherent in all lifestyle judgements

Because all perspectives are to some extent reflective of culture and context, it is inevitable that there will be differences of interpretation and opinion among intelligent, well-meaning people. Moreover, because the communities in which we live – even our local congregations – are comprised of people from a wide variety or backgrounds and perspectives, we must acknowledge that there will inevitably be a range of individual perspectives on matters related to biblical interpretation and personal morality.

We understand the topic of human sexuality is sensitive. Engaging in a topic like this demands care and maturity. We believe it is no coincidence that many groups in our church have been praying over, studying, and discerning Ephesians 4:1-6. This passage speaks to the standard we are called to live as Gospel-believing people, which is rooted in the oneness and unity that Christ provided us (and to which we are called to maintain, with God's help).

<sup>1</sup> As a prisoner for the Lord, then, I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received. <sup>2</sup> Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. <sup>3</sup> Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. <sup>4</sup> There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; <sup>5</sup> one Lord, one faith, one baptism; <sup>6</sup> one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all.

**Ephesians 4:1-6**

## **BIBLE & THEOLOGY**

I'm currently reading a book titled "5 Smooth Stones of Pastoral Work". This book makes a plea for the use of the Bible, especially the Old Testament, as a foundation to build upon what a pastor does.

Those 5 smooth stones, along with their corresponding books of the Bible, are:

• Prayer-Directing: Song of Songs

Story-Making: Ruth

Pain-Sharing: Lamentations

Nay-Saying: Ecclesiastes

• Community-Building: Esther

There is much to share from this powerful book. For now, I'd like to share the snippet below, which offers helpful ways of thinking about salvation. Of course, there is larger context in play, but I believe this snippet represents itself well enough. I pray we consider what is being explained in this text and are able to live our lives appropriately in relation to it.

I appreciate the author's linking of the love commandments with salvation. I also value the author placing salvation within the realms of physical reality (using words such as "history" and "present" and "personal"). Israel's response to salvation was a feast, speaking to the human response in creating tradition, all in the effort to remember what God has done. The boldened text is my own emphasis.

"Salvation is the act of God in which we are rescued from the consequences of our sin (bondage, fragmentation) and put in a position to live in free, open, loving relationships with God and our neighbors. The double command "love God ... love your neighbor ..." assumes salvation as a background. Without God's act of salvation we are "dead in trespasses and sin." With God's act of salvation we are able to be addressed by a whole series of commands by which we are ordered into live, whole, healthy relationships with God and other persons.

**Salvation was God acting decisively in history** so that each person, both individually and corporately, was free to live in faith. Salvation — God doing for us what we cannot do for ourselves, overcoming the powers of bondage, leading through the forces of evil, establishing the people in fact as God's beloved — was announced in the Feast of Passover as **present and personal**.

Salvation means to be whole again, to be delivered in the midst of peril. Far back toward the Hebrew root of the word, it may even suggest that no matter how closely the evil hedges you about, God will yet clear for you all the space you need to move around it: "I called upon the LORD in distress: the LORD answered me, and set me in a large place" (Ps. 118:5, KJV). Passover was the concentrated, annual attention that Israel gave to God's definitive act of saving love."

### Personal reflection...

From January 8-12, I had a special opportunity to attend the Children's Pastors Conference (CPC), which is organized by the International Network of Children's Ministry (INCM). This conference is held in Orlando, FL, and it was a little warmer there than it is here. © I have attended this conference once before, in 2019, by myself. This time, I was able to go with a couple partners in ministry from Crosswinds Wesleyan church. We had a wonderful week together!

To give you an idea of how this conference works, it is open to anyone who works in children's ministry, anywhere in the world. Most people are from the US and Canada, but we had some international children's ministry workers there as well. There were about 2,000 of us gathered together in Orlando! The conference itself is held all day on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. Each day, we worshipped together a few different times, led by a band from a large church in Nashville. It was evident that the Holy Spirit was with us during each of these worship times. As a large group, we also heard from 2 speakers each day, and they encouraged us and gave us new insight into God and His word. We also were able to attend "breakout sessions," which are topics relevant to ministry that we choose to attend based on what we want to learn in our current season of ministry. These sessions were for 25-50 people, depending on the topic.

Just as He did in 2019, God met me in Orlando and spoke to my heart. He showed me things in my life that need to change, and he reminded me of His grace and mercy. He also reminded me of how important children's ministry is for the future of our church and for the future of Christianity. I'm so thankful to be a part of a church family who values children's ministry. The ministry that happened in this church family 100 years ago is still having an impact today! And, unless Jesus returns first, the ministry that is happening now will have an impact 100 years from now. Whatever part you play in children's ministry, it is important and has eternal benefits. If you aren't yet involved in children's or youth ministry, how's the Lord calling you to jump in?

## Reflections & Learnings

**The Cause** youth program continues their journey together through the "Can I Ask" that curriculum. Recently, they have discussed the contents of the chapter titled "Is Jesus really the only way to God?"

Our **Youth Ministry Team** continues their faithful work in youth ministry! For 2024, our team will be experiencing a slightly different expression to our regular connects. Instead of a formal agenda with a 1-hour meeting, we will shift our posture and share a meal together, bond through a fun activity, conduct an established devotional and prayer time, and engage in ministry discernment.

Our **Youth Sunday School** continue their activities between church services! For our High School students, they are wrapping up a series titled **The Outsiders**, where our group will learn about how to live in the Kingdom of God every day. They will then venture into a series titled **Marvel**, which helps students explore what it means to have a lifestyle of worship. Our Middle School students are journeying through a series titled **Who Am I**, which helps students discover their unique identity in Christ.

The **Middle School Youth Club** group has recently covered sessions about forgiveness, community, being known by God, and remembering the God is with us. This month, they are working through a series titled "**I Am Secure**". These sessions are all produced by Hyfi curriculum.

For January, our **Special Events** included our **Potato Bar fundraiser** during the annual meeting, which support our mission trips. We also held a **youth lock-in** event for our youth, which included an overnight stay at the church for our Middle School and High School students.
