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# From Noah to Jacob



As we continue our study in the book of Genesis, the story becomes more specific during the months of July and August. We will move from the story of Noah to Jacob.

After the great flood, Noah's descendants repopulate the earth, leading to the Tower of Babel, where humanity's languages are confused and people are dispersed. God calls Abram to leave his homeland, promising him numerous descendants and a blessed nation, and changes his name to Abraham. Abraham and his wife Sarah eventually have a son, Isaac, through whom the covenant continues. Isaac's twin sons, Esau and Jacob, vie for their father's blessing, with Jacob ultimately receiving it through deception. Jacob's life is marked by divine encounters, struggles, and dreams, including his vision of a ladder reaching to heaven. He marries Leah and Rachel, and his twelve sons, including Joseph, become the patriarchs of the twelve tribes of Israel.

It is through this family that God will ultimately bring salvation to all nations. As we read the story, we do so through the lens of Jesus. Without this story, we cannot fully comprehend the depth and complexity of the Gospel.

I hope you will join us each week as we move through the story together. I have provided additional readings to supplement your reflection. These are the same readings we will use in worship each week..



### CHILDREN'S AND FAMILY MINISTRY

#### Personal reflection...

I have a confession to make. I am not very good at resting. In fact, if you ask my husband or my kids if I rest (other than sleeping), they might say "not really," or "I don't think so." One thing that I've learned as I've worked in ministry and as I have become older is that I need rest. I'm not talking about sleep at night. I typically get a good amount of sleep. I'm also not talking about a nap because I'm definitely not a napper, and I don't plan to become one. I'm talking about the gift of rest that God gives us. Pastor Wade preached about rest on June 2, in case you missed it. This sermon was so pertinent to me that Ryan leaned over and whispered in my ear, "I think this message was meant for you."

Let me explain a bit about why I don't rest well. First, I am a perfectionist. So, when I do something, I like to make sure it is done well and done correctly. For example, I rearrange the dishwasher because there is a perfect way to load it, and my family doesn't seem to do it quite right. I admit this is not a healthy characteristic. I have learned to let some things go. God blessed me with three children for many reasons, but one of them is very clear - to completely and totally disrupt my perfectionism! So, over the years, I have let some things go. My house does not stay as clean as I would like. My kids shove their laundry in their drawers instead of folding it, resulting in most outfits they wear being a wrinkly mess. I have learned other things, too, and my perfectionism has been challenged again and again.

The other reason I have trouble resting is because I LOVE making to do lists and checking them off. It gives me so much pleasure, in fact, that sometimes I write down a task right after I did it - just so that I can cross it off the list! (Crazy, I know). Not only do I have 'to do' lists written down digitally on my phone and on paper, but I also have 'to do' lists in my head. They sound something like this, "When I have time, I will...." Or, "when I'm done with this, I need to..." So, with these lists constantly bombarding my thoughts, I find it really challenging to sit down and just relax. I'd much rather keep crossing off my list.

God is working and moving in my life and showing me the benefit of rest. I've also been able to show myself what happens when I ignore my need to rest. It's not pretty. God modeled rest for us because He loves us. He designed us to need a 'work - rest - work - rest' pattern in our life. When I take time to rest on a weekly basis, God shows me how valuable the rest is. After I rest, I have new energy to tackle my never ending to do lists. And, you know what? During the time I rested, nothing went wrong; nothing horrible happened because I didn't answer a text, email, or phone call. I got the rest I needed and the world kept turning without me.

I think what is difficult for everyone about resting is that it is counter cultural. Our world, our culture glorifies being busy. How do I know this? Well, many times when I ask someone, 'how are you?' the answer I get includes something like, 'I'm so busy!' What really breaks my heart is how many parents are teaching their children that they must be busy. Parents often seem to enroll their children in an activity and when that is done, they choose the next one. No rest in between. In fact, often activities overlap. And, typically, children are not just active in one activity, they are involved in 2, 3, 4 or more! So, what often convicts me is that I want to show my children that it is ok to rest. I want to show them that this gift from God should be enjoyed regularly, no matter what the world says. I hope you and your family will join me in a pursuit of rest this summer and maybe even choose a few less activities in the fall. ~ Deb

#### Youth

The Adult Education Ministry Team continues to meet periodically to plan for the Fall program semester, our special events, and other ministry matters.

# PASTORAL REFLECTIONS

In lieu of a Bible & Theology article, I have written a reflection for this summer edition of the Lamplighter. The last 30 days (or so) have included the end of many of our regular programs, including Sunday school, Youth Club, The Cause, and ministry team meetings (among others). I have individual reflections for each of the items listed, but have yet to tie all of those reflections together. Looking forward, my work pivots toward special events and preparation for the Fall for the next 60 days. Sprinkled in between this work includes increased "breathing space" in my calendar. I plan to use those quieter moments like a professional athlete uses their off-season - *seek rest, increase strength* (physically, mentally, spiritually...), and *hone skills*.

# Program Year Reflection

1 As a prisoner for the Lord, then, I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received. 2 Be completely humble and gentle; be patient, bearing with one another in love. 3 Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace. 4 There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to one hope when you were called; 5 one Lord, one faith, one baptism; 6 one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all. - Ephesians 4:1-6

Pastor Wade prayerfully selected this as a verse for a prayer group last summer. It has been a focus in many of the ministries since then. This verse proved to be relevant for the journey we've been on. All aspects of my particular ministry experienced sensitive and difficult conversations that demanded careful and wise handling (refer to verse 1-3 above). If navigated poorly, there was potential for unnecessary divisions (refer to verses 4–6).

Now here we are, on the other side of those intentional conversations, and I am *grateful*. I'm *appreciative* of all the adults in our church family that joined me in our Sunday School classes. Our group represented a variety of deeply held convictions. Those differences were not insignificant. With those differences present, we maintained a loving relationship with one another, in Christ. I'm *proud* of our high school students, who journeyed in the same (and more!) sensitive conversations with one another. Their handling of these topics was *inspiring*. I'm *thankful* for the various ministry teams and co-workers on staff that participated in discernment and planning of these conversations. Their participation and presence was vital in making it all happen.

During all of this, I learned much about myself, both as a pastor and a person. I have much to improve, and I hope the following approach to my "off-season" will - with the Lord's help - mold me more into the person I ought to be.

# Off-Season Strategy

- Seek Rest The volume and weight of this year's workload has left me drained (and that's O.K.!). Aside from my work, I look forward to increased family time, friend time, gardening time, and kayaking time.
- **Increase Strength** Physical & spiritual formation/discipline are on my summer agenda. Physically, my focuses include weight lifting and running. Spiritually, my efforts are reserved for prayer, scripture reading, and spiritually-focused relationships.
- Hone Skills There are plenty of pastoral/theology books and online classes for me to dive into. I don't have space to list them in detail, but my general focus is developing a Christian worldview and living out a life of faith.

# PASTORAL MINISTRY

This month's article is the **third** of a series of reflections on my personal preparations for the 2024 election. As part of my preparations, I am reading through a list of books from trusted authors that I believe will challenge me to be the person I should be (the full list can be found in April's Lamplighter).

The **third** book I read was **Strange Religion**, written by my (favorite) professor, Nijay Gupta (a New Testament scholar). He is a professor at Northern Seminary, where Pastor Wade completed his Doctor in Ministry degree (and where I hope to as well, some day!). I believe this book is a good "next step" after reading the previous two books I've reflected on, as it gets into the distinguishing marks of a Christian and the faith community. It is evident to me that Christian formation into Christ-likeness is *upstream* of politics. If we want to see improvements in our political environment (I certainly do!), then the focus must first be on continuously transforming ourselves into the faith community God calls us to be. Dr. Gupta's book gives us a glimpse into first century Christians and what this faithful community lived like, surrounded by their own broken world.

I start this short article on my takeaways with the last paragraph of the book:

The first Jesus followers were okay with being different, deviating from the status quo, following Jesus and His way wherever they went. Perhaps there is a need today for the modern church to pick up a bottle [this is in reference to a coconut water metaphor he used in the book] of their religion and say, "Hey, that looks different, but good and refreshing things sometimes come from weird places".

This resonated with me. In America's political sphere, I feel out of place. This quote reminds me that historically, I'm not the only Christian who didn't fit the societal norms of the day. To use a couple of Gupta's words here, that "strangeness" or "weirdness" is fertile ground for God to do His work. "Deviating from the status quo" can be difficult, but the following distinctions that Dr. Gupta shares about first-century Christians (which were neatly organized in the last chapter of his book) provides encouragement and calibration for me this election season:

- **Obsessed with Jesus** While most in the ancient world were religious, it seemed that Christians took it to a whole other level. Christians claimed Jesus was supreme. [*Obsess over Jesus, not our presidents*].
- Mind on the Future Christians behaved in accordance with the promises they believed in (that Jesus was coming back and will make things right). This didn't mean disengagement from the world around them, but rather committing to daily labor and contributions in society in a peaceable and Christ-like manner one that would direct other's attention to that same hope of fulfilled promises through Jesus.
- A Religion of the Heart Gupta shares that Christianity was distinctive for the emphasis on belief, trust, love, genuine action, and the inner life. I love the following quote: "Jesus often taught on this notion that real and lasting change can come only from inner transformation, because behavior follows belief and the intentions of the heart". [Christian preparation for the election starts in the heart].
- A "God-with-Us" Religion Ancient gods did not roam freely on earth, but Christians believed in a God that wanted to be with people on earth. Jesus "ascended to rule earth from heaven, and the Spirit was sent to spread the presence of God across the whole world". God wanted to be with us because God loved us. [I appreciate the cosmic scope of "God with us" God is bigger than any political realm].
- The "Love of God", *not* "Peace with the gods" God loves us, and we love God. This concept would have been *weird* for other ancient people. *Christians were a household of love and belonging*.
- The Church as a Utopian Community Christians are not and were not perfect. "But in their best moments, you see a beautiful family of faith". They lived with the mindset that it was possible with the Lord's help to have a world transformed toward goodness, charity, peace, joy and prosperity.

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
