# Gratitude in Action: Recognizing God's Gifts and Living in Response

As we complete our study in Genesis this month, we will reflect on all that God has been doing throughout the study. Following this series, we will begin a two-part series on gratitude before the Advent season. Certainly, this is an appropriate time to consider thankfulness for all God has given us. We will spend the fourth Sunday of November eating too much food on a holiday called *Thanksgiving*.

So what does it mean to be thankful? What is gratitude all about?

In the first sermon (November 17), we will examine the parable of the wedding banquet. The invited guests refuse to come, opening the seats to the least likely attendees. When the king, who represents God, provides for improbable guests, one guest refuses to wear the provided attire. His actions show a lack of gratitude. He is given much but refuses to align his actions with the king. Thus, gratitude involves understanding all that God has done for us and responding to the grace given to us. It is more than a simple *thank you*. It is about submitting our lives to our Creator and allowing God to remake us into all He wants us to be.

In the second sermon (November 24), we will reflect on the story of the ten lepers. While all receive healing, only one returns to give thanks. We will also explore Psalm 107, which describes how spiritual healing comes through a grateful heart. Gratitude is more than a polite *thank you*. It is a life posture of response to God's blessings.

May this season of Thanksgiving be more than a hearty meal. My prayer is that God reveals the blessings in our lives and helps each of us learn to live lives of gratitude.

I hope you will join us each week in worship. Below are the Scripture readings for each week for you to read before coming to church. May this harvest season prompt us to consider all God has given us.

## A 2025 Mexico Mission Trip is being planned and organized!

You are invited to come and learn more... Thursday, November 14th from 6:00pm-8:00pm at the Werts' home 195 Saxton Lane. Dinner and fellowship at 6:00pm followed by an introduction to this Living Waters for the World (LWW) trip. March dates are being considered. It is planned as a "work trip" to upgrade the LWW water plant in Cedralito, Quintana Roo, Mexico which was installed in 2011. Other days may include visits with brothers and sisters of faith at churches and water plants in Limones and Tabi.



Several overnights will be in Bacalar and it is hoped we may reconnect with the faith family at Iglesia Emmanuel where several United Church members may remember the Presbytery trips and your partnership. And of course there will be a day of tourism! It appears that the newly excavated Mayan Ruin of Ichkabal, near Bacalar, will finally be open. Yes, we are recruiting team members...do you have a heart for serving others? Do you speak Spanish? Are you under 70 years and willing to serve as a driver? Or are you simply open to a transforming opportunity to serve on a Living Waters for the World mission which has empowered community and church leaders in the rural community of Cedralito (population approximately 400) to continue a sustainable ministry providing clean water at an affordable price. ### **Denominational Hurricane responses**

Hurricanes Helene and Milton devastated many parts of the southeast in the last month. There are immense short-term needs and as it will take years to recover in some areas there will be long-term needs as well. Let us all keep the affected people in our prayers. Our denominational responses are outlined below.

\* \* \* \* \*

**PDA** (**Presbyterian Disaster Relief**) is in communication with all affected presbyteries and National VOAD (Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster) to share information and coordinate resources as damage is assessed. PDA has deployed a National Response Team to Tampa Bay Presbytery, Presbytery of Western North Carolina, Northeast Georgia Presbytery and Holston Presbytery. They have approved several initial assistance grant requests and are anticipating additional requests from affected presbyteries to help respond to needs in their communities.

PDA is part of a large and dedicated community of disaster response organizations. PDA has three initial deployment teams in Tampa Bay Presbytery, Holston Presbytery (Eastern Tennessee), and Western North Carolina Presbytery. Two additional deployments are scheduled to Northeast Georgia Presbytery and Foothills Presbytery (South Carolina).

In addition, PDA has sent six initial assistance grants to six Presbyteries to support unmet immediate needs and two church damage grants. We anticipate additional grant requests.

Progress is being made but much emergency/response work needs to happen to restore basic services. Please continue to pray for survivors, those who have experienced loss of loved ones, and responders.

Know that your support of PDA is addressing immediate needs and will provide the necessary resources to support the long-term recovery, which will take many years.

While Helene was still gaining strength over the Gulf of Mexico, the Rev. Lisa Harris Lee, director of **ABHMS'** (American Baptist Home Mission Societies) Healing & Transforming Communities unit, communicated with Dr. James Harrison, executive minister of American Baptist Churches of the South, and other ABCOTS leaders to inform them about ABHMS' plan of action, which includes working alongside these leaders as soon as is practical to coordinate needed assistance following the immediate support provided by FEMA, local agencies, the Red Cross and other first responders. Said Harris Lee, "This timely outreach demonstrates ABHMS' commitment to both early disaster relief efforts and longer-term renewal of lives in the weeks, months, and years to come."

OGHS funds are directed to the designated disaster areas in the U.S. and Puerto Rico to address immediate needs and often long afterward as additional needs emerge. All your gifts will make a difference in the lives of people you may or may not know and show the love of God when and where it is needed most.

The World Relief Committee of the Board of General Ministries of American Baptist Churches USA administers OGHS. The committee facilitates American Baptist emergency relief, disaster rehabilitation, refugee work and development assistance by establishing policy guidelines and overseeing the distribution of the annual OGHS offering received by churches.



# Personal reflection...

This month, I'm sharing an article from "Focus on Faith" because I think we can all use more of God's peace in this tumultuous world we live in.

If you've been around the church for any length of time, you've likely heard Philippians 4:8 quoted. It is a familiar verse—that we should focus our attention and our minds on things that are true, noble, right, pure, lovely, and admirable. Some of us can even repeat the list by heart.

But there's something incredibly important about this verse that often goes overlooked—the context!

The Holy Spirit, through the Apostle Paul, didn't place this verse in isolation. Just like almost everything in Scripture, it is part of a broader conversation. It's not an instruction without promise. It's actually part of a conversation on how we find peace in our lives.

In the verses just before, we are instructed to bring our worries, our anxieties, and our struggles to God through prayer. He encourages us to present our requests with thanksgiving, and in return, we are promised something remarkable: "the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

That's a verse we know well, right? Many of us have leaned on it during difficult times, trusting in God's peace to guard our hearts.

But Paul doesn't stop there.

He goes on to reveal another key to experiencing peace that transcends understanding. Immediately after talking about prayer, he instructs us to shift our focus to "Whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things."

And then ties that practice again to peace: "Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me—put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you."

In other words, peace doesn't just come from praying about our anxieties. It also comes from what we fill our minds with each day. Our thoughts shape our worldview, our emotions, our responses, our actions, and our words. When we dwell on the noise of this world—ungodly entertainment, toxic media, negative influences—our hearts and minds become restless, anxious, and unsettled.

But when we intentionally focus on things that are true, noble, pure, and praiseworthy, we invite the peace of God into our lives in a deeper way.

Are you in need of more of God's peace in your life today?

If so, Paul gives you three steps to begin realizing it: 1) Present your requests to God with thanksgiving; 2) Focus your attention on the things of God; and 3) Put this into practice.

God's peace is available to you today. And that is exactly how we find it.

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things. Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me—put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you." Philippians 4:6-9

# Reflections & Learnings

There is preliminary work being done in nuancing the **young adult ministry** into college student ministry and 20/30-something ministry. These groups have different needs, and there may be a strategy in having these separate groups overlap at times. More prayer and discernment needed.

The women's group (led by Stephanie Wall, and is considered a 20/30-something ministry) continues to meet at our church every other week or so. This group is growing in size and serves as a wonderful example of what ministry for this demographic can look like.

An FLCC Christian club continues. Wendy Bacon is supporting this club and is keeping us informed as to how we can best support them. Also, our College-aged-young adults lunch and Bible study has started up again. We are currently attempting to meet weekly after church, though this will fluctuate frequently due to the dynamic lives of our college students.

The Adult Education Sunday School Hour continues with a Bible Study on Genesis (to complement the Genesis sermon series, Adult Education Retreat theme, and the November lecture), We also continue to host the Parenting Coffee Hour, which provides a casual atmosphere for parents to come (even if they are late!), fellowship, take a breath, and engage in relevant faith discussions. There are prayerful plans for additional Adult Education Sunday School classes, so keep an eye out for updates in the coming months!

As always, **Adults** in our church are engaged in various **small group ministries**. To name a few, we have our Men's breakfast, Women's circles, Bible study groups, knitting group, and prayer shawl knitting. Jen Eveleigh and I are also making progress on the **Small Group Ministry Initiative** at the church. We have identified potential Small Group Leaders, and are looking to make connections with them before coming back to the congregation as a whole with small group offerings.

For **Special Events**, we are coming up on our first **The United Church Seminar** (November 2), with our guest lecturer being Dr. J. Richard Middleton. The seminar's focus is How we respond to suffering in our own life, the church, and in the wider world via a biblical theology of prayer. We also get to enjoy music from David Kraft, Earl & June Pettit, Joy VanRiper, Nancy Burt-Preece, and Georgia Sperano! Please come to support this event, and provide constructive feedback on this type of the event for future consideration.

We began our **monthly "adult" connect** at Ferris Hills on the first Wednesday of the month. We have several churches represented during our time together. I am discerning with the residents, the Ferris Hills Staff, and ministry partners as to what this may look like long term.

The **Adult Education Ministry Team** continues to meet every other month or so. This year, our team includes: Brenda and Bob Cunningham, Steve Simpson, Gary Preece, Gail Benjamin, Adam Thorman, Bev Fehrenbach, and Melissa Long.


# PASTORAL MINISTRY

In this new-year season, we prepare our hearts to remember and celebrate the coming of Jesus, and lean onto the future hope and promises of the Lord's *second* coming. At our church, we have a tradition of providing Advent-themed devotionals to aid in that preparation. Please see below for this year's offerings:

### Come, O Come, Emmanuel: A Liturgy for Daily Worship from Advent to Epiphany

**Description**: O Come, O Come, Emmanuel by Jonathan Gibson presents a 40-day devotional liturgy guiding readers through Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany—helping them keep their eyes fixed on Christ. Designed as a resource for the holiday season, each reading includes a guided meditation, applicable Scripture readings, hymns, prayers, creeds, and prompts for petition and confession. For individuals and families, this devotional will help Christians focus on Jesus and meditate on the mystery of his incarnation.



Our "little church" - as the great reformer Martin Luther would describe a family - gets to worship the Lord every day together. ## The Advent of Glory: 24 Devotions for Christmas

**Description**: These straightforward, short, and profound Advent readings have been edited from talks given by much-loved Bible teacher, Dr. R.C. Sproul, helping readers to benefit from his enduring insight and wisdom. They delve into the details of the Christmas story and reflect on how these impact our lives now, combining scholarly detail with heartwarming application. Each day also includes a prayer written by a well-known Bible teacher of our own day, to guide your own reflections.

**Note**: RC Sproul is a legendary author, and shares a Presbyterian heritage. This devotional is expected to be accessible yet deep. *55x copies have been ordered for this Advent season*.



#### The King of Christmas: All God's Children Search for Jesus

**Description:** Inspired by the story of the magi and Mary's Magnificat, The King of Christmas invites children and families to share the joy of searching for Jesus during Advent. Join the wise men as they follow the light of the Christmas star, journeying over sea and field, through market and temple, to find the King of Christmas.

**Note**: I came across this book after using similar books from the same publisher with Carter. They are very well produced and are theologically competent. Recommended age is 4-8. *A copy of this book will be available in the children's library in the upstairs Chapel.*
